Can we all agree that some heavy metal music is scary? It is October and for October I like to pick an album that is a little dark and a little heavier than my usual jazz or classic rock albums. Last year I picked Black Sabbath's monster of a compilation album We Sold Our Soul For Rock n Roll. This year I thought I would choose one of the, if not the greatest, thrash metal album of all time. Metallica's Ride The Lightning.

This album is truly a masterpiece. This album has zero "skips" on it. Not a single song disappoints. Every song is beautifully recorded, engineered and mastered by highly skilled technicians. That combined with the raw musical skill of James Hetfield, Kirk Hammit, Cliff Burton, and Lars Ulrich come together and they crafted a true work of musical art. This album really changed the direction of the thrash metal genre. Previous to Ride the Lightning, most thrash metal albums were very raw and under-produced. This changed when Metallica went to a professional recording studio in Copenhagen. After Ride the Lightning was released, there was a trend for high production thrash metal albums to be released and that is still the trend today.

Upon its initial release the album was a hit with both the public and critics alike. Many of the most highly acclaimed music publications had rated this album very highly and with some publications they gave it a perfect score. The album also went on to sell millions of copies in the US and Europe. Currently the album holds a RIAA 6 times platinum in the US and BPI gold in the UK. It is safe to say that this album sold extremely well and had a lasting impact on its genre. Even if you do not care for heavy metal, I think you should give this album a listen. You might be pleasantly surprised.


World Food Day

Domestic Violence Awareness

October is Domestic Violence Month, and while it has a dedicated month to raise awareness, that doesn't mean that it dies down for the rest of the year. Even just being alert of some of the statistics and warning signs could save lives: yours or someone else's.

- On average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States.
- 1 in 4 women and 1 in 9 men experience severe and life threatening domestic violence at some point in their lifetime.
- 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have experienced some sort of domestic violence by a partner.
- On a typical day, more than 20,000 calls are made to a domestic violence hotline.
- 19% of domestic violence involves a weapon.
- Only 34% of people injured in domestic violence are able to receive medical care.

In domestic violence cases, the partners aren't the only ones affected. Children, siblings, or other people both in and out of the home can be involved. Your friends, fellow classmates or people you pass walking down the hallways could be impacted by a domestic violence situation. Even just taking five minutes to educate yourself or other people on warning signs or safety resources in your area could help save lives. Help is available. If you or someone you know is in danger, call 911 or a helpline like 800-799-7233, or text 88788. Along with that, there are shelters available, like Sisters in Shelter, located in Tiffin Ohio. It's hard to reach out for help, but there are people here for you.

DID and Self-Diagnosis

The commonality of someone self diagnosing themselves with a mental illness is growing everyday. This is caused by many things but one of the biggest influencers is Tic Tok. Tik Toc is primarily used for entertainment but I can also be used to learn and find new information. One of these is advocating and bringing awareness to different types of mental illness. One of these includes dissociative identity disorder, DID. With the rise of awareness of such mental illnesses also brings self-diagnoses. DID has become one of the more common mental illness for people to self-diagnose. But what is DID? And what is the appeal of self-diagnosing this mental illness? I sat down with Dr. Meagan McBride PhD, Ipcc-s to find out.

Madison: So what is DID?

Dr.Meagan: So, DID is a complex psychological disorder. It stands for dissociative identity disorder. It used to be called multiple personality disorder. It is a disorder, that is, the onset is when there are severe traumas that happen in a specific developmental stage of a child's life. So there are different types of dissociating but with DID that is the body and the brain shut down so much to protect the individual from the experiences that they've had. There has to be at least two distinct personalities housed in the same person. And those personalities have different characteristics. Typically different ages, sometimes different genders. More rare is different races, though that is less common. It is a rare disease, about 1% of the population. Some estimate as high as 3% of the population, but that is really a wild kind of guess. But those who present with it and are treated for it is about 1% of the population. So it is of note that of those diagnosed with DID and who are seeking treatment or are in treatment or have been in treatment only about six-ish, maybe 10% of those folks openly disclose having DID. So, the current trend of sharing it and talking about alters and those pieces is actually atypical from what the data has shown us in the past. So there is a component that's important to note, and that is that one of the key markers of DID is an amnesia type symptomatology. So those with DID have a mixture of dissociative symptoms and also trauma response symptoms. And they have symptoms that aren't trauma responses, but that marker of loss of time or loss of awareness around personal information, those are typically indicators. So when, when someone is losing time or losing awareness, but is still functioning in their day-to-day and, and has no ability to recall that information, those are typically indicators of DID. Now there are other things that could be going on for someone if they're experiencing some of these pieces, but the differential diagnosis for DID are typically more common than the DID

Madison: So DID doesn't usually have more than five people?

Dr. Meagan: Correct.

Madison: Or even three?

Dr.Meagan: So there's a lot of shows and movies or books that highlight DID. It really gained popularity after the movie *Split*. There's also some older movies and shows there are documentaries particularly of a woman, who experienced it, who had more than three to five. But again, those are really rare and really extreme cases of DID.

Madison: But is having an extreme amount of numbers of personalities posible?

Dr.Meagan: It's atypical and there's no max that somebody can have. But to be developing systems like that, there would've had to have been extreme traumas that happened in a very specific window and then it would've needed to go untreated for a, a pretty extensive amount of time.

Madison: Can people within a system talk to each other?

Dr.Meagan: So that is a really interesting question. So there's sometimes people will talk about D I d and they'll talk about their alters. Typically the individual with d i d is one of the last people to become aware of it. And they're not typically conversing with their alters. There are some psychiatrists and psychologists who say that alters can communicate with each other. [continued on next page]

Madison: But is having an extreme amount of numbers of personalities posible?

Madison: Can people within a system talk to each other?

Dr.Meagan: So that is a really interesting question. So there's sometimes people will talk about DID and they'll talk about their alters. Typically the individual with DID is one of the last people to become aware of it. And they're not typically conversing with their alters. There are some psychiatrists and psychologists who say that alters can communicate with each other. But again, it's really rare and there's not been a ton of people who can be studied, but especially in people who are first presenting with DID, the awareness of the alters is not typically there. And alters being aware of each other is rare at best.

Madison: So connecting this to self-diagnosis, why are people doing this?

Dr.Meagan: So on why, we've got to back up. So we have seen a general increase in people self-diagnosing, but also we've seen a general increase in people experiencing mental health concerns, especially since covid. Right? But there also is a need to feel a part of a group or a need to be a part of something bigger than yourself. And sometimes we're different or we feel different. And so having a label to explain that makes us feel better. But why the increase in DID? there's always an interest in the things that are rare or the things that are really different. And DID on its surface is neat. The idea of possessing more than one identity or more than one person, or somebody having somebody inside of you that is going to protect your inner child, right? There's something really comforting about that. So I think there's a number of reasons that we're hearing more people say that they have DID. There's also a shock value to it, right? So the reasons might be really individual. And maybe it's something as simple as people learning their inner dialogue, right? And our inner dialogue sometimes has different tones and inflections and maybe sometimes, like you're really just having a conversation with like, what would be your mom or your dad, right? Or maybe you're role-playing in your head, a conversation between your friend and, and using those to help guide you as you make decisions. And so it could be as simple as people learning to understand their inner dialogue, and it could be as complex as someone struggling with mental health stuff, not really knowing what it is or, it's the the current favorite of seeing it in a movie or seeing it on TikTok and self-diagnosing.

Madison: But always reach out to a mental health counselor and never diagnose yourself based on TikTok. Or if you're having concerns, always find a physician?

Dr.Meagan: So just like we talked about in our last interview, any time there's a concern, the place to go is to a licensed credential mental health worker, get the assessment and then get the treatment that helps you to live a healthy, successful life. What I don't want anybody to do is to turn to social media, to turn to TikTok and use that as their guide. If there are any concerns, reach out. Use your resources at school, talk to your adults in your life and seek out a mental health professional who can help navigate that path forward.

Día de los Muertos

Estimated to be about 3000 years old, Día de los Muertos or Day of the Dead is a traditional holiday derived from Aztec history. It combines traditional Aztec traditions with All Saints' Day, a holiday also celebrating the dead that was brought by Spanish invaders in the 1500s. It is a holiday meant to honor the deceased. Traces of the holiday first originate from Mexico, where the Aztecs would use skulls to honor the dead. However, different customs and ways to celebrate have developed over the years.

Día de los Muertos may have started in Mexico but it is now observed throughout all of Latin America. The holiday is celebrated on November 1 and 2. Although it is meant to recognize the dead, Día de los Muertos is not meant to be a sad occasion. It is seen as a joyful time to memorialize past relatives and loved ones. To celebrate, families will set up alters for their decreased family members, so their spirits can find their way back. The alter usually has pictures of relatives, some of their favorite foods, and some of their favorite objects. After the alter is created, families go to the tombstones of their loved ones to feast and talk to them. Because the holiday is not meant to be sad, skeletons are used as decoration. These skeletons remind people that death is a part of life and that they too will be skeletons someday.

Día de los Muertos is a very significant holiday in Mexican culture and heritage. It is not just a day of celebration and feast, but a day to honor and remember the lives of loved ones that have passed away.

Diwali: The Festival of Lights

Diwali, or Dipawali, is the largest and most important holiday of the year in India. For reference, it's just as important to Hindus as Christmas is to Christians. Diwali was celebrated this year on Monday, October 24, 2022. The dates vary due to the moon's position; however, it usually occurs around October and November. The central part of the festival occurs on the third day of the holiday. Diwali lasts five days: the 13th day of the dark half of the lunar month, Ashvina, to the second day of the light half of the lunar month, Karttika. In short, this means it starts on the darkest day of the lunar month, which is why many aspects of the holiday revolve around lit objects. Participants light diyas (oil lamps made from clay), and candles around their houses, symbolizing their victory of light over darkness. These lit objects, in Hindu, are meant to represent the worship of Laxmi, the god of wealth, good fortune, youth, and beauty.

The exchange of gifts during the five days has also become a prominent part of the holiday. Along with these gifts, there is usually a grand feast followed by sweets.

What started as a Hindu holiday has become a national celebration; with over one billion people celebrating Diwali, it is observed today in Sikhism, Jainism, and Buddhism. Though the holiday is honored by many religions, the actual celebration is unique to individual regions. In Northern India, individuals celebrate the return of King Rama in the Ramayana, the second most crucial legend in Hinduism. While in Southern India, they celebrate the defeat of the demon Narakasura by Lord Krishna.

As of Thursday, October 20, 2022, Mayor Eric Adams of New York City announced that Diwali would be recognized as an official holiday in the NYC school district. With over 200,000 New Yorkers identifying as Hindu, Buddhist, Sikh, and other faiths celebrating Diwali, this legislation was long overdue. The bill replaced the Anniversary Day holiday so that they did not intrude on the minimum of 180 days of instruction requirement under New York state law. "It is long overdue to say to our Hindu, Sikh, Jain, and Buddhist students and communities that we see you; we acknowledge you... The inclusiveness of this city is extremely significant, and this is our opportunity to say that in a loud way," Mayor Adams stated in an interview.

While there is no set of instructions to follow, many prepare for the holiday similarly. On day one, to help bring good fortune, participants go out, buy gold utensils, and clean their homes. On day two, houses are decorated with clay lamps, and rangoli (designs similar to flowers) are drawn on floors, usually with colored powder or sand. On day three, families gather together; pray for Lakshmi Puja, the goddess Lakshmi; then eat feasts followed by celebrations. The first day of the new year occurs on the fourth day when relatives and friends visit with gifts. Finally, brothers will visit their sisters on the fifth day, and they will, in turn, make a feast for them.

So how can you celebrate Diwali? Diwali is a holiday that anyone can observe. Generally, it is a time for new beginnings, such as visiting friends and family, feasting, feeding the poor, buying new clothes, and setting off fireworks- though they have been limited in India due to their noise and pollution effect. Even though Diwali recently ended, you can still celebrate by lighting candles, spending time with your friends and family, and celebrating your victory of light over darkness.

Game of the Month: Resident Evil 3

With Halloween around the corner, why not look at an entry from one of gaming's most iconic horror series? Resident Evil 3 (2020) is the remake of Resident Evil 3: Nemesis (1999), released after the success of the Resident Evil 2 remake. And while that game wasn't perfect, many Resident Evil fans were looking forward to the remake of Nemesis. Was it any good? Did it deliver? In some areas yes, but mostly it wound up being a mess in terms of quality.

The very beginnings of RE3's problems start right when the game begins with its main protagonist, Jill Valentine. Jill is one of the franchise's most recognizable and iconic characters, appearing in the series since the original Resident Evil back in 1996. She's normally portrayed as very likable and witty, but this game tosses that aside and changes Jill for the worse. And like this game her character is a complete mess. Traits are added to her solely to make her "cooler," and are then dropped minutes later never to resurface again. The most notable of these added traits is Jill's PTSD, which isn't a bad addition to the character considering the traumatic experiences she was a part of in RE1. Which could have been a good addition to her character if it wasn't abandoned after the first 5 minutes of the game never to be heard of again. She's made far ruder and more sarcastic, which can make her unlikable in certain moments. Oh, and she just swears like a sailor- all the time. This makes Jill even more unlikable, and ruins some moments because she just really needed to swear at that moment. Once again, this feels this was added to her character for no reason other than to make her seem "cool." Which they don't. These changes are mostly either pointless or just make Jill a pain to listen to since she swears in almost every line of dialog she has.

Despite the train wreck that is Jill's character, the game actually does a good job with most of the other characters. The standout performance from any of the characters is Nikolai (the main human villain of the adventure). He steals the show whenever he shows up. He's written as much more of a mustache-twirling villain (more openly evil) compared to older portrayals of him, but it works surprisingly well and is quite enjoyable to watch play out. To add to this, his voice actor does an incredible job with the material he's given. But on a sour note there's one character that the game massacred even more than Jill. And there's a reason his name is no longer in the title.

Nemesis was one of the most defining features of the original RE3, and is why the game is called RE3: Nemesis. He was a terrifying, rocket-launcher-wielding monster that would chase the player (Jill) throughout the whole game. He could even chase the player through loading doors (a series first at that point). His only goal was to kill Jill. In the remake he is pathetic, just pitiful. The game opens immediately with Nemesis bursting into Jill's apartment "Kool-Aid man-style", and going into an awful scripted chase (meaning the player has hardly any input and is basically just watching a cutscene at that point). Originally Nemesis was built up through clues the player would have to find throughout the game, but this game reveals him way too early. But besides that, this Nemesis is also incredibly stupid. He is given so many chances where he's holding Jill by the throat or skull about to kill her, and just doesn't. He just throws Jill on the ground and lets her escape. When he's pointing a flamethrower at her skull he just stands there with it. And lets her escape into a building. When he finally gets his signature rocket launcher (in another scripted chase), he slowly takes it out and guess what? Waits to fire it, of course and his accuracy using

He's presented all of these chances to kill Jill, but he just doesn't make him not only less menacing but he also appears dumber in the eyes of the player since he's basically playing with his food. He also just disappears at points in the story randomly to show up again at some random point later. In the original he had a near constant presence pursuing Jill throughout Raccoon City. In this he hardly shows up, and by the end he's relegated to a series of boss fights. Speaking of those boss fights....

RE3's boss fights aren't terrible. Resident Evil isn't a series known for great boss fights, but RE3's are okay. The worst one is the final fight with Nemesis. Which is one of those boss fights you have to be trying to lose to actually lose it. Otherwise the boss of this game are actually improvements compared to the RE2 Remake. Though those boss fights weren't much to brag about.

One of the most important aspects of a RE game is the exploration and the world you explore. Re3 fails in the field. Its main map for Raccoon City is tiny and is incredibly boring. It doesn't have any fantastic landmarks or anything that makes it memorable. The sewers beneath it are just a lazy reuse of assets from RE2, and your time there is so short the area doesn't make an impact. The clock tower, one the most memorable areas from the original, is shown, but the player is never given a chance to climb and explore it. The hospital map (entirely new to the remake) is actually a decently designed map. But the area after it, Nest 2 (Umbrella's secret underground lab) is, once again, just a reuse of assets from the RE2 remake. Overall, besides the hospital, none of these locations are memorable or fun to explore. At least this game will have some good bonus modes to make up for its lackluster characters and maps. Right?

After completing the main campaign the player has the option to...replay the main campaign. And after that they can...replay the main campaign. Yeah, this game doesn't have any other content besides the main campaign. It has no raid mode, no mercenary mode (both modes that historically appeared throughout the season), no second scenario, no alternate scenarios. Nothing. All there is to do is the main campaign, which doesn't last long (it only takes about 3-4 hours to beat). The lack of additional content severely hurts the replayability of the experience. One final grudge against this mess is how Jill's classic costume was handled. Jill's outfit was changed in the remake and many longtime fans missed her classic outfit from the 1999 original. Capcom put it in the game, but locked it behind a paywall (meaning it costs real world money).

Yes, it only cost \$3, but Capcom was really only trying to squeeze more money out players pockets in an incredibly scummy move.

There aren't really any more positives to the experience. The game looks good, the core gameplay loop can be enjoyable, and besides some other previously mentioned positives it's an incredibly flawed experience. However despite its flaws it can still be a fun time, as long as you're willing to ignore its mistakes. And put up Jill's swearing; god she swears a lot.

Movie of the Month: Don't Worry Darling

Ryan Rodney Reynolds was born on October 23, 1976 in Vancouver, Canada to James Chester Reynolds and Tamara Lee Stewart. He had three brothers (Jeff, Patrick, and Terry Reynolds), and he was the youngest of them. As a kid, he was always self-conscious and nervous, and he found at a young age that he could use his vulnerability to his advantage when he was acting.

He starred in a fair amount of school productions, but his first big acting role was at the age of 12 as Billy Simpson on a Canadian teen drama titled *Hillside*, which was renamed *Fifteen* when it aired in the United States.
